GARDENERS AND THEIR BOOKS

One of us has a refrigerator magnet that says: "If you have a garden and a library, you have everything you need." It's attributed to Cicero, but could have been written by us, especially if the library contains lots of Garden Books!

We were talking together about our love of books - especially of gardening books - and began sharing our favorite titles, past and present. We thought we would share these favorites with you, our fellow gardeners, in the hope that you would recognize some and learn about others.

The Garden books that we have read and collected over the years seem to fall into several distinct categories, as follows:

- A) HOW-TO BOOKS, which can then be either GENERAL GARDEN INSTRUCTION or on SPECIFIC TOPICS
- B) BEAUTIFUL PHOTOGRAPHIC BOOKS about FAMOUS GARDENS or GARDENING METHODS (such as BORDERS or MEADOWS, etc.)
- C) REFERENCE BOOKS, which can be on broad topics (such as TREES) or specific topics (such as NEMATODES)
- D) GARDEN MEMOIRS, REFLECTIONS ON THE GARDENER'S LIFE
- E) ESSAY COLLECTIONS ON THE "PHILOSOPHY" OF GARDENS AND NATURE, and OUR ROLE IN BOTH WHAT MIGHT BE CALLED "WISDOM" BOOKS
- F) CHILDREN'S BOOKS TO INSTRUCT OR INSTILL A LOVE OF GARDENING THROUGH STORYTELLING
- G) NOVELS THAT CENTER ON OUR INTERACTIONS WITH NATURE

As with most things, there are trends in garden books, such as the recent focus on Native Plants and Pollinators, which is crucial at this time. The important thing is that the books keep coming, and in great variety, even in these days of consulting "Prof. Google" about everything! There are promising book reviews in every issue of the gardening magazines, and a trip to the Bookshop area of the NYBG Gift Shop Is delightfully overwhelming.

The wonderful, beautifully produced books in categories (A), (B) and (C) make for great browsing and finding specific information or advice, and are a pleasure to behold.

For this article, though, we would like to focus on the books in (D), (E), (F), and (G), which are books to curl up with for a GOOD READ! The titles we are sharing with you are our individual favorites - some are well-known and some less so, but each has stayed with us in a unique and personal way. So here they are:

MEMOIRS, REFLECTIONS, WISDOM

A Way to Garden by Margaret Roach

A hands-on primer for every season by a very popular writer and blogger.

Braiding Sweetgrass by Robin Wall Kimmerer

As an indigenous scientist, the author demonstrates how all living things provides us with gifts and lessons, and gives us an ecological understanding of nature.

The Comfort of Crows by Margaret Renkl

Beautifully written essays on experiencing nature throughout the year, and what meaning we can derive from these experiences. The author writes a weekly column for The NY Times. The essays are illustrated with gorgeous full-page illustrations by the author's brother.

Musings of a lifetime gardener.
